The draw for the 20 teams took place this afternoon in the Qatari capital which sees them placed in five groups of four.

The top two teams from each group will progress to the finals in 2011 joining hosts Qatar as well as the top three finishers in last year's AFC Asian Cup Finals - Iraq, Saudi Arabia and Korea Republic. Two other slots will be reserved for the champions of the 2008 and 2010 AFC Challenge Cups.

I suggested the idea to his parents 3 months after his departure. It was hard for everyone at first, but after a while they were receptive to it," said Thaddeus' aunt, who is a general practitioner.

"The book was written through accounts of family, friends, schoolmates, CCA-mates, and my own experiences with him. A lot of input to the book came at his wake, from even strangers. For example, there were some girls who came, Thaddeus had actually given them math tuition, which we never knew."
