Where were the first aid staff?

Qualified medics should have been at hand to save Thaddeus

THE tragic death of Thaddeus Cheong (picture), a Raffles Junior College athlete who collapsed during a South-east Asian Games selection race, is cause for some serious reflection.

We are qualified first aid personnel and find it strange that no one performed any type of resuscitation after Thaddeus failed to respond to verbal stimuli. We also cannot understand why medics and an ambulance were not on standby for an event of this scale, with such a high casualty risk.

Also, why didn't a single coach step up when Thaddeus collapsed? Sports coaches are qualified in first aid as that is a requirement before they can be awarded their certification.

Even smaller scale and lower risk intra-school sports meets have first aid stations covering the entire venue.

During cross-country meets of schools, first aid personnel stationed along the route tend to anyone who is injured or unwell through the course of the event. There is also a base station at the finishing point where athletes are at the greatest risk of exhaustion or, in the worst cases, cardiac arrest.

Secondary injuries should be accessed only after the victim's airway is clear and when he or she is breathing and has a pulse. Even if the cause



of the collapse could not be determined, the lack of heartbeat or a pulse should have called for cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

CPR-qualified personnel should think about preserving the life at hand, rather than technicalities such as the absence of a heartbeat.

Brain injury begins if blood supply is denied to the organ for at least four minutes and is irreversible after a continued absence of flow for up to 10 minutes. Even if first aid reaches the victim after four minutes, CPR should still have been performed to give the victim a fighting chance at survival until the paramedics have arrived.

On the Triathlon Association of Singapore website, it states that relevant certification and experience are necessary for first aid officers. Also, they have to work with the duty safety officer on the race day.

Were first aid personnel present on that day? What is the job scope of safety officers? Were they qualified to perform CPR?
